Ronald Reagan is often linked to California and the American West. But he was born and raised in Illinois, in the center of the United States. His father sold shoes, and his mother mostly took care of Ronald and his older brother, Neil. The president apologized for any part he had played in the events. Polls showed that, in general, the American public accepted his apology and continued to trust him. Unlike most U.S. presidents, who lose public support during their terms, Reagan finished his time in office as he had taken it with the support of more than half of Americans. Legacy.
