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Emerging adulthood is a phase of the life span between the adolescence and also full-fledged adulthood which encompasses late adolescence and early adulthood, proposed by Jeffrey Arnett in a 2000 article in the American Psychologist. It primarily describes people living in developed countries, but it is also experienced by young people in urban wealthy families in the Global South. Jeffrey Jensen Arnett proposed emerging adulthood as a developmental stage between adolescence and young adulthood. From this perspective, active identity exploration may not take place beyond adolescence. This idea is supported by research , which found that a majority of emerging adults were engaged less in identity experimentation and more in working toward adult responsibilities and commitments. False Limit on Identity Exploration.
