*British prehistory* - updated review of doctoral research in the production and distribution of later prehistoric pottery and briquetage/salt in western Britain (1500-50 BC); investigation into the nature of Iron Age pottery production and distribution systems in the Andover area of Hampshire; the production and distribution of salt during the later prehistoric and Roman

periods in Britain; investigation of women potters and saltmakers in later prehistoric and early Roman Britain; production and distribution of pottery and salt in later prehistoric Kent is a new area of focused research

*Caribbean prehistory* - new research into the prehistoric ceramics of the eastern Caribbean

*Colonial history* - new research into the Afro-Caribbean ceramics of the eastern Caribbean

investigation into the nature of artefact production and distribution systems in Iron Age Britain; ceramic vessel forms and their functions; extraction and trade of salt in later prehistoric and Roman Britain; Caribbean prehistoric and Afro-Caribbean pottery production, use and trade

training the next generation of researchers into the study of ceramics as significant a material culture resource for understanding past human behaviour; management of a major project for English Heritage creating a Gazetteer and database of collections of later prehistoric pottery in England; developing new methodologies for systematic study of later prehistoric ceramics; the preparation of advice manuals for field archaeologists on the analysis and publication of finds and pottery generally and prehistoric pottery specifically; recognition of the distribution of salt in ceramic containers throughout western Britain during the later prehistoric period; co-editing of and principal contributor in major volume of research into the production and distribution of salt in eastern England during the prehistoric and Roman periods; senior contributor in the investigation and publication of research about a British colonial fortification in the eastern Caribbean and encouraging fellow researcher to pursue Ph'D into colonial fortifications in the Leeward Islands of the eastern Caribbean
